

CONDITIONS Governing the 2020 Gazprom Neft Cup KHL International Kids' Hockey Tournament

1. Tournament Management

1.1. Ultimate overall responsibility for managing the Gazprom Neft Cup International Kids' Hockey Tournament (hereinafter "the Tournament") rests with the Organising Committee.

1.2. Work directly related to preparations for and running the tournament rests with the Executive Directorate, which is responsible for day-to-day liaison with hockey academy representatives, players, trainers, referees and other persons involved in organising the tournament, including by telephone, by post, and by electronic mail (e-mail).

1.3. The decisions of the Organising Committee and the Executive Directorate are binding on all Tournament participants.

2. Tournament Rules

2.1. The Tournament will be held pursuant to the IIHF Rule Book 2018-2022 of the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF), excluding those instances cited in 8.1 and 9.1 of these Conditions.

2.2. Tournament participants must demonstrate a knowledge of and abide by the IIHF Rule Book and by the terms of these Conditions.

3. Tournament Venue and Dates

3.1. The tournament will take place in the city of Sochi, between 12 and 18 April 2020.

4. Tournament Plan

4.1. Matches are divided into preliminary (elimination or knock-out matches) and final matches. In the first round teams are divided into eight groups, by lots, and play in a "round robin" system.

4.2. Teams placed first or second in each group in the first round then compete (on a "play-off" basis) for places 1–16 in the final round, with all games being drawn by lots.

4.3. Those teams placed third in the first round compete for places 17–24 in the final round (on a "play-off" basis), with no games being drawn by lots (and each losing team withdrawing from the Tournament).

4.4. Those teams placed fourth in the first round compete for places 25–32 in the final round (on a "play-off" basis), with no games being drawn by lots (and each losing team withdrawing from the Tournament).

4.5. Those teams placed fifth in the fourth round compete (on a "play-off" basis, depending on the number of teams participating in the Tournament) for places 33–36 in the final round, with no games being drawn by lots (and each losing team withdrawing from the Tournament).

5. Tournament Participants

5.1. Participation in the Tournament is open to teams from hockey academies receiving an official invitation from the Tournament Organising Committee and comprising players born in 2009. Players born in 2010 will be admitted to the Tournament provided items 6.4.5 or 6.5 of these Conditions are adhered to.

5.2. Hockey academy management must confirm their participation in the Tournament by 20 January 2020 by forwarding an official letter and a Preliminary (Detailed) Application (Appendix 1 of these Conditions) addressed to the Executive Directorate at cup@gazprom-neft.ru. Such Preliminary Application may include no more than 40 (forty) players. Such Application should include the following information for each player: name, surname and patronymic; date of birth; squad position; usual squad number; and players' height as at the time of submitting the application. A photo must be submitted for every player included in the Preliminary Application. Preliminary Applications will be posted on the official Tournament Internet site, at <http://www.gpncup.ru/teams>.

5.3. Hockey academy management must ensure the following are forwarded to the Executive Directorate by 10 March 2020: team arrival and departure dates; railway or flight codes; and the number of hockey players, coaches and team leaders attending.

6. Tournament Admissions Committee

6.1. The Admissions Committee comprises representatives from the Executive Directorate and the Main Referee Board (hereinafter – "the MRB").

6.2. Teams must appear before the Admissions Committee no later than 15 minutes prior to the start of team training. If a team, for any good reason, does not engage in team training, the Admissions Committee may take place no later than one hour prior to the start of such team's first game in the Tournament.

6.3. On appearing before the Admissions Committee all teams must present their Official Application, completed in accordance with Appendix 2 of these Conditions. The Official Application must be endorsed by the forwarding organisation and an appropriate medical agency and must include: the names, surnames and patronymics (where appropriate) of all players; their dates of birth; their permanent or current registered addresses; their squad positions; and their usual squad numbers. The Official Application may include no more than 25 persons, including: two goal tenders, 20 on-ice players (as per the Preliminary (Detailed) Application), and three official representatives (team manager, coach, doctor). The Official Application must be provided in duplicate.

6.4. Russian teams are required to append the following to their Official Application:

6.4.1. the birth certificate for every player (original);

6.4.2. a statutory insurance policy (original);

6.4.3. a hockey identity card for each hockey player, showing:

a) a recent photograph;

b) the official seal or stamp of such player's place of education;

c) the official seal or stamp on behalf of any agencies responsible for registration at the player's permanent or temporary place of residence; and

d) confirmation of each player's acceptance at a hockey academy, endorsed with the official seal or stamp of such academy.

6.4.4. If such identity card does not meet the above requirements, or if a player does not have a hockey identity card, certification must be provided from a municipal or local housing or utilities organisation (bearing the seal or stamp of such organisation), or certificate from a multi-function service centre (MFZ), or stamped certification from a school of general education. It is mandatory that these documents include: the name, surname and patronymic of each player, his date of birth, and his current or permanent registered address.

6.4.5. The following must also be provided in respect of hockey players born in 2010:

a) medical clearance (approval) to play for older age-group teams; and

b) notarised consent from such player's parents (or other legal guardians) allowing participation in senior competitions.

6.5. International teams are required to append the following valid and current official documents to their Official Application, confirming the following data in respect of each player: name, surname and patronymic (where appropriate); date of birth; medical clearance (approval) to compete; for children born in 2010 – medical clearance (approval) to play for older age-group teams; and parental consent allowing participation in senior competitions.

6.6. Assuming the above requirements are met, the participant and/or team will be admitted to the Tournament.

6.7. Team coaches must be in possession of parental (or other legal guardian's) Power of Attorney entrusting them with responsibility for the life and health of the child and authorising such coach to take any decisions necessary in protecting the rights and interests of such child, including in respect of any medical intervention should this become necessary.

6.8. A scanned copy of the Official Application must be forwarded to the Tournament Executive Directorate at cup@gazprom-neft.ru by 2 April 2020.

6.9. All hockey academies are responsible for the accuracy and validity of any information provided in respect of players.

7. Tournament Programme

12 April	Team arrivals. Admissions Committee. Training. Meeting of the Executive Directorate, attended by official team representatives and members of the Main Referee Board.
13 April	First-round games.
14 April	First-round games. Tournament Opening Ceremony.
15 April	First-round games.
16 April	Final-round games.
17 April	Final-round games. Tournament Closing Ceremony and Awards Ceremony.
18 April	Teams participating in the Tournament depart.

8. Conditions Governing Tournament Matches

- 8.1. Each preliminary stage game consists of three periods, each comprising 12 minutes' Preliminary Key stages total playing time. Each final stage game consists of three periods, each comprising 15 minutes' final stages total playing time.
- 8.2. Cleaning and resurfacing of the ice will take place prior to the start of each match, followed by at least five minutes' warm-up for hockey players, on the ice.
- 8.3. The time shown on the Games Timetable indicates the start time for each game. Teams will go out onto the ice five minutes before the start of each game to warm up.
- 8.4. Breaks between periods during Tournament matches will be five minutes long; there will be no re-icing.
- 8.5. Breaks between periods in Tournament Ceremony matches may be extended at the discretion of the Tournament Executive Directorate.
- 8.6. No later than 30 minutes prior to the start of each match the coach will hand the official scorer, present in the Situation Room, the scorecard for the match. The form for completion will be given to the team coach by another member of the MRB.
- 8.7. The team shown first on the fixture list is the "home" team, and plays in a dark strip. The team shown second on the fixture list is the "away" team and plays in a light strip, in a contrasting colour.
- 8.8. Changes to hockey players' team numbers during the Tournament are not allowed.
- 8.9. At the end of each match the Chief Referee must obtain an Official Game Sheet from the official scorer; verify this; make any notes, as appropriate; sign it; and, no later, than 10 minutes after the end of the match, give the Official Game Sheet to the coaches of the competing teams who, in turn, are obliged to verify and sign it. All signatures made on the Official Game Sheet by coaches or medical personnel should be made in the Situation Room.
- 8.10. Official scorers will present match scorecards to the Referee Board. Each Game Sheet will be assigned a serial number for the game in line with Tournament fixtures.

9. Adjudication of Tournament Results

- 9.1. At the preliminary (group) stage, team group rankings will be determined on the basis of the greatest number of points gained in matches. Two (2) points will be awarded for a win, one (1) point for a draw, and zero (0) points for a loss.
- 9.2. In the event of two or more team rankings being equal, advantage will be given to the team demonstrating the best performance in terms of the following (shown in order of priority):
 - a) the number of points scored in games between those teams;
 - b) the difference between goals scored and goals conceded in games between those teams;
 - c) the number of goals scored in games between those teams;
 - d) the difference between goals scored and goals conceded in games with all teams in the relevant sub-group;
 - e) the number of goals scored in games with all teams in the relevant sub-group; and
 - f) the lowest penalty time (the lowest number of penalty minutes) accumulated in games with all teams in the relevant sub-group.
- 9.3. In the event that the above criteria remain identical places will be determined by a draw. The following will take part in such draw: representatives of the Executive Directorate, the Referee Board, and representatives of those teams tying on points. The Executive Directorate of the Tournament will, in advance, prepare sealed envelopes containing pieces of paper showing team rankings (1, 2, etc.). The first to draw an envelope will be the representative of whichever team is first by alphabetical order, who will open the envelope showing the place to be taken by his team thereafter. Representatives from other teams will then determine their teams' places on the same basis. Such draw shall take place no later, than two hours before the start of matches of the final stage.
- 9.4. In the final stage games, in the event of a tie at the end of regulation play, teams will take turns in a five-shot (5-shot) penalty-shot shoot-out; in the event of a tie at the end of such penalty-shot shoot-out, shots will be taken, in turn, until one team gains the lead.
- 9.5. Penalty shot shoot-out procedure.
 - 9.5.1. The procedure for a penalty shot shoot-out to determine a winner will begin with five players from each team, in turn, taking a shot at goal. These players will not be listed in advance. All players from both teams listed in the Game Sheet can take penalties, except for those indicated in item 9.5.2.
 - 9.5.2. Any hockey player serving a penalty or penalties which have not expired prior to the completion of the overtime period is not entitled to participate in a penalty-shot shootout to determine a winner. These players must remain in the penalty box or in the dressing room during the penalty-shot shootout.
 - 9.5.3. Goaltenders must defend the same goal net as in the overtime period. Goaltenders may be changed after each penalty-shot. The goal tender not defending the goal should remain on the reserves' bench.
 - 9.5.4. Players from each side shall take penalty-shots in turn until a deciding goal is scored. The remaining shots are not then taken.

9.5.5. If, after a series of five penalty shots from each team, the score still remains at a draw, shots will be taken by each team, in turn, by the same or new players until a winning goal is scored. The first shot is taken by players on the team taking the last shot in the preceding five-shot penalty-shot shootout. Penalty shots by either side continue until a player from one side scores a goal, and the player from the other side fails to, at which point the team scoring the goal wins the game, and the game comes to an end.

9.5.6. Re-icing is not required prior to a penalty-shot shootout.

9.6. Adjudication of results for matches cancelled or for which results are annulled (disqualified):

9.6.1. where a match takes place and is completed, and the team under penalty loses, the result of the match is not annulled and remains the same.

9.6.2. where a match takes place but is not completed, or where a match takes place but the team under penalty wins, the result of the match is annulled and the team in question is deemed to have suffered a technical defeat – 0:5, although points are not awarded. The competing team is deemed to have secured a technical victory – 5:0 and is awarded two points.

9.6.3. In the event of a team arriving more than 15 minutes late to a game, an Official Game Sheet will be collated and signed by the Chief Referee regarding their non-appearance, with that team deemed to have suffered a technical defeat – 0:5.

10. Presentation of Awards to Tournament teams and Participants

10.1. The team winning first place will be awarded with the Gazprom Neft Cup (a perpetual trophy, to be retained for one year) and all team members and coaches awarded medals. A shield will be placed at the base of the Gazprom Neft Cup showing the name of the winning team and the year. The management of the winning team may determine, independently, where the Gazprom Neft Cup is to be kept, but no less than 60 calendar days prior to the next Tournament the Executive Directorate will retrieve the Gazprom Neft Cup from the winning team and present them with a smaller copy of the Cup as a replacement.

10.2. Second- and third-placed teams will be awarded commemorative prizes, and their players and coaches awarded second- or third-place medals, accordingly.

10.3. Individual special prizes will be awarded to the winners of the following nominations: “Best goal tender”, “Best defender”, “Best forward”, “Most productive player (in terms of goal and passes)”, “Best player”, and “Best coach”.

10.4. A special prize will be awarded to the team nominated for “Most disciplined team” – this being the team awarded the least number of penalty minutes, proportional to the number of matches played in. The prize under this nomination is awarded to the team captain.

10.5. At each match of the Tournament special prizes will be awarded to the best player from each team. At the end of the match the coach will determine the best player on his team and advise the linesmen on the rink of that player’s number. The official scorer will record this player on the match scorecard. Before the teams shake hands the commentator will announce the best players of the game, who will then approach the referees’ table, where they will receive their awards from members of the Referee Board.

10.6. Additional prizes may be made available by the Tournament Organising Committee, the Executive Directorate, and/or Tournament partners, with a list of these being further approved by the Tournament Executive Directorate.

11. Refereeing of Tournament Matches

11.1. The Referee Board comprises the Chief Referee, the Tournament Secretary, the Tournament doctor and their deputies.

11.2. The Referee Board’s responsibilities include:

11.2.1. participation in the Tournament Admissions Committee;

11.2.2. the appointment of game referees;

11.2.3. the disqualification of hockey players and team officials;

11.2.4. participation in supervising preparations for and the conduct of matches at venue rinks;

11.2.5. compilation of match results;

11.2.6. consideration of appeals;

11.2.7. distribution and collection of Official Game Sheets;

11.2.8. compilation of statistics;

11.2.9. compilation and updating of data displayed on venue information stands;

11.2.10. distribution of pucks to Chief Referees; and

11.2.11. Members of the MRB may be involved in awarding prizes for the best players in individual matches and/or in awarding special prizes, as necessary.

11.3. The Referee Board is responsible for refereeing games under the three-official system (one Chief Referee and two linesman) together with five (5) off-ice officials: the chief scorer, game timekeeper, statistician, and two penalty timekeepers.

11.3.1. Prior to the start of a match the Referee Board is responsible for:

- 11.3.1.1. assessing the hockey pitch (rink) and assessing the quality of the ice and its suitability for the match;
- 11.3.1.2. checking the bulletin board; and
- 11.3.1.3. confirming all players taking part in pre-match warm-ups have the full and correct kit and strips (uniforms), as well as monitoring compliance with item 8.8. of these Conditions. The Referee Board at any match has the right to refuse admission to any incorrectly equipped players.
- 11.3.2. At the end of a match the Referee Board is responsible for:
 - 11.3.2.1. making a note in the Official Game Sheet under "Disciplinary faults by players and team officials" in the event of a player and/or team representative being awarded a penalty for misconduct prior to the end of a game or in the event of a match penalty being awarded; and
 - 11.3.2.2. checking the Official Game Sheet (final score, penalty minutes, goal scorers, pass makers, etc.)

12. Tournament Appeal Procedures

- 12. 1. The management of any team wishing to contest the results of a game must advise the Chief Referee and a representative of the opposing team of this immediately after such game. Any such appeal will be recorded in the official record of the game. Any such appeal must be made in writing, must clearly state the grounds for such claim, must be signed by the team coach, and must be delivered to the Chief Referee no later than 30 (thirty) minutes following the end of the game.
- 12.2. Untimely or incorrect appeals will not be recorded on the Official Game Sheet and will not be considered.
- 12.3. Appeals will not be considered if they relate to decisions on:
 - 12.3.1. offside positions;
 - 12.3.2. the correct scoring of goals;
 - 12.3.3. the location of players on the pitch;
 - 12.3.4. face-off spots; and
 - 12.3.5. any other penalties (imposed or otherwise).

13. Participants' Liability Under Disciplinary Offences at the Tournament

- 13.1. Participants' liability for penalties, for Game Misconduct, and for Match Penalties, will be determined by the Referee Board and the Executive Directorate of the Tournament.
- 13.2. A hockey player, coach or team official receiving a Game Misconduct Penalty (5+20 minutes), a Match Penalty (25 minutes) or two disciplinary penalties (10+20 minutes) is automatically disqualified from his team's next fixture (next scheduled game).
- 13.3. Team coaches are personally responsible for ensuring their own and their players' disqualifications are served.
- 13.4. A disqualified coach is entitled to remain in the stands or on the balcony opposite the reserves' benches at the relevant sports facility, but not in close proximity to his own team's reserves' bench.
- 13.5. The procedure for determining penalties and the disqualification of players and team officials following misconduct during the Tournament is given in Appendix 3 of these Conditions.
- 13.6. The Referee Board representatives are obliged to forewarn Chief Referees as to which of the players will miss the next match, and for what reason.

14. Official Tournament Photo Sessions

- 14.1. The following mandatory photo sessions will take place during the Tournament.
 - 14.1.1. The following photo sessions will take place prior to the start of the Tournament (but no later than 30 minutes prior to training or, where a team, for any good reason, is not having a training session, no later than one hour prior to the start of such team's first match in the Tournament):
 - 14.1.1.1. each member of a team, in full kit, on skates, without a stick and without a helmet;
 - 14.1.1.2. the coach/coaches and all team officials, as well as all team management included in the Official Application; and
 - 14.1.1.3. The full team will be photographed, together with their coach/coaches (the players in full kit, on skates, without sticks and without helmets);
 - 14.1.2. The following photo sessions will take place after the awards ceremony:
 - 14.1.2.1. those teams taking I, II and III place, including the full team with their coach/coaches;
 - 14.1.2.2. the best players, nominated for special awards;
 - 14.1.2.3. the best coach;
 - 14.1.2.4. the captain of the team awarded the prize for "Most Disciplined Team".

15. Tournament Training Sessions

- 15.1. Each team is entitled to one training session of no more than 45 minutes.
- 15. 2. The schedule of training sessions will be compiled on the basis of team arrivals and will be forwarded to teams in advance.

15. 3. Pucks to be used in training sessions will be set out on team benches by rink staff.

16. Skate Sharpening for Tournament Participants

16.1. Skate sharpening is available at each rink from 8:00 am until the end of the final match or training session of the day, for the duration of the Tournament. Skate sharpening is free for all Tournament participants.

17. Group Allocation Draw Procedures:

Team Group Allocations – Tournament Draw:

17.1. The draw procedure shall be determined by the Tournament Executive Committee.

17.2. The draw procedure shall take place no later than two weeks prior to the start of the Tournament.

17.3. The draw procedure shall be undertaken in line with teams' Tournament performances in previous years.

17.4. No group shall include more than two Russian teams representing a single Inter-regional Coordination Centre of the Russian Ice Hockey Federation (RIHF).

A maximum of two Russian teams representing the same Russian Ice Hockey Federation (RIHF) Inter-regional Coordination Centre may be included in any one group.

18. Safety and Medical Care of Tournament Participants

18.1. Participants' and spectators' safety shall be ensured pursuant to legislation currently in force in the Russian Federation, and pursuant to current regulation of the Russian Ice Hockey Federation.

18.2. Medical care provided to participants and spectators shall be undertaken pursuant to legislation currently in force in the Russian Federation, and pursuant to current regulation of the Russian Ice Hockey Federation.

19. Financial Conditions Governing the Tournament

19.1. All expenses relating to the Tournament will be covered by Gazprom Neft PJSC and the "Home Towns" Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Fund, including the following:

19.1.1. return transportation of out-of-town teams from airports or railway stations to their accommodation and, on those days on which games are played, return transportation from their accommodation to game venues;

19.1.2. accommodation and three meals per day for those participants listed in Official Applications, for the duration of the Tournament;

19.1.3. production of trophies and souvenirs;

19.1.4. rental of sports and ancillary facilities, and sports and technological equipment and supplies;

19.1.5. the provision of qualified medical personnel throughout all games;

19.1.6. public cultural and media events;

19.1.7. preparation and management of the Opening and Closing ceremonies, as well as other expenses related to preparation for and management of the Tournament, excluding expenses specified in Clause 19.2 of these Conditions.

19.2. Participating teams in the Tournament shall bear the following costs:

Participating teams shall be responsible for covering the following costs:

19.2.1. return team travel to Tournament venues; and

19.2.2. all travel, accommodation, subsistence and transport services for any persons accompanying the team and not listed in the Official Application (including players' parents).

20. Other Conditions

20.1. On all matters not covered by these Conditions Tournament participants are governed by the decisions of the Organising Committee and the Executive Directorate.

20.2. The Organising Committee and the Executive Directorate retain the right to supplement and/or amend (clarify) these Conditions provided that any such amendments do not contravene the Regulations governing the Gazprom Neft Cup KHL International Kids' Hockey Tournament as approved by the Chairman of the Organising Committee.
